The group are pleased to say that the January talk 'Zeppelins Over Loughborough' presented by Carillon Museum curator Mel Gould was very well received and attracted a large turnout. Mel took us back to the night of 31st January 1916 when four bombs were dropped on Loughborough by a German Zeppelin airship heading for Liverpool. Sadly, ten people were killed in the raid and twelve were injured. We were informed that the Zeppelin passed near to Quorn and the next day had left the school children in highly nervous condition.

Our next talk 'The Day Buffalo Came to Town' sees the return of local historian Tony Jarram who will be charting Tony's chance visit to Buffalo Bill's grave site back in 2005 and the impact this American scout, hunter, and showman (real name William Frederick Cody), had on the little back wood town of Loughborough in rural Leicestershire during his visit of 1903. Another talk not to be missed so hope to see you there at St Bartholomew's United Church on Monday 28th February. Pay on the door guests £4 and members £2 Refreshments included, and all are welcome!

Just a reminder that we move to Baptist Church to join them for the 28th March talk 'Quorn Baptist Church 250th Anniversary +2' which will presented by Ian Smith. This covid postponed talk will provide an interesting insight into the founding and the history of the Quorn Baptist Church, how the buildings have grown and changed, snippets of church life and a chance for questions and tours of the building. Entry is free and refreshments will be provided.

The 'Quorn as a Tourist Destination' display is still running in the Community Library during the library opening hours until Apil when it will be replaced by a new display featuring the Quorn Jubilee celebrations.

Membership - If you haven't yet renewed your membership, it's not too late membership numbers are very healthy and if you would like to join us you really would be welcome simply visit our web page.


Project updates
