It looked after its own people, fed them, watered them, and provided work. But everything changed during the 19th century. The Industrial Revolution arrived! People started moving from the rural areas into the larger villages and towns, wanting to work in the new factories that were springing up all over the country. Belgrave is now a suburb of Leicester, and today hosts the National Space Museum. Come along to find out about its history and how it developed from the era of the Domesday Book. Grants available now for Quorn Local History

We are pleased to announce that Quorn Local History Group is offering grants from £50 up to £1,000 to support projects about Quorn's history. Such projects may be research adding to the understanding of Quorn's history and heritage, recording,

interpretating, or involving people in our history and heritage through exhibitions, events, or other activities. The research must aim to tell us more about the history and heritage of the village but could cover a wider area provided it is applicable to Quorn. The criterion for applications is below. Criteria for accessing the QLHG project funding 2023.

1. Appropriate Project Purposes

- a. To undertake a piece of research that will add to our understanding of Quorn's history.
- b. To preserve/record Quorn's history.
- c. To involve more people in Quorn's local history, eg exhibitions, events, walks, talks etc

2. Who can apply?

- a. This fund can be accessed by any group, resident or former resident of Quorn or the surrounding area with an interest in local history who wishes to research a historical subject relevant to Quorn.
- b. There is no minimum age for participants so those in full-time education will be considered.

3. Requirements

- a. The research must aim to tell us more about the history of the village but could cover a wider area provided the research is applicable to Quorn.
- b. The research must be undertaken from reliable sources, and where appropriate show where the information has come from.

4. How to Apply

- a. In writing to quornlhg@gmail.com to include:
- b. Applicant details.
- c. Type of project, eg research, event etc.
- d. Detailed subject matter.
- e. Project aims, scope and timescale.
- f. Amount of grant required, with breakdown of estimated costs.

5. Assessment criteria

- a. Does the project meet one of more of the project purposes?
- b. Does the applicant meet the criteria above?
- c. Does the project duplicate other work?
- d. General assessment of the value of the project.
- e. Is the amount reasonable?

6. What can the funding be used for?

It can be used to cover any legitimate costs which are necessary to undertake the research/project. For example: travelling expenses, materials, entry to historical places and buildings, paper resources, copying primary sources, room hire. The project funding will initially be for one year but extended if thought necessary by application to the QLHG committee.

7. Project Results

- a. Research type projects will need to be presented to the QLHG committee in the first instance but then be assessable for the residents of Quorn through inclusion on Quorn Village On-line Museum (www.quornmuseum.com).
- b. The research could be presented in any medium appropriate for inclusion in the on-line museum a written report, a video, an audio presentation or photographs.
