80th Anniversary of D-Day – One year ago a group of village volunteers came together to coordinate a series of appropriate commemorations to ensure that Quorn plays it part in commemorating this national event. The 6th June 2024 marks the 80th anniversary of D-Day, when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion, the world has ever witnessed. In 1944 Operation Overlord saw around 4,000 ships and landing craft set down about 132,500 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of north-west Europe from Nazi occupation. On the evening of the 5th June 1944 up to 1,500 aircraft with gliders flew 13,000 soldiers from the British and American paratroopers, air landing infantry and support units to Normandy. By the day's end, over one hundred and fifty thousand Allied troops had successfully stormed the now famous Gold, Juno, Sword, Utah, and Omaha beaches to achieve a toehold in France. Quorn has particular connections with D-Day, the US 82nd Airborne's 505 Parachute Infantry Regiment, HMS Quorn, the ATS, the RNAS nearby Beaumanor Hall and of course the many local people who took part and contributed. 
